Assessment of Family Interaction

The following assessment was influenced by the Family Environment Scale (FES), a research questionnaire that has ten factors: 1) Cohesion, 2) Expressiveness, 3) Conflict, 4) Independence, 5) Achievement Orientation, 6) Intellectual-Cultural Orientation, 7) Active Recreation Orientation, 8) Moral-Religious Emphasis, 9) Organization, and 10) Control. Wikipedia describes this instrument that is used for research, which is not our purpose here; our's is to elicit thoughtful consideration.

Statements below do not question specific details. They are *metaphorical* guides designed for self/family inventories. Healthy and toxic families each come in many forms. Forty positive and negative descriptions roughly describe family behaviors.

Go over the list and check those items that loosely describe your family. There is no score, but it is obvious there is an advantage to having more checks in the white rows than in the shaded areas. Family members will need to decide how to proceed.
